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### **Crime Victims in Long-Term Care Facilities: "We Can All Respond To Crime"**

This February Washington State Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program (LTCOP) launched a first-of-its kind initiative, "We Can All Respond to Crime" to promote ease of access to the Crime Victim Advocacy network for individuals living in long-term care facilities. This new initiative provides both a website ([www.waombudsman.org/education/crime-victim-support/](http://www.waombudsman.org/education/crime-victim-support/)) full of resources and is backed with nearly 300 volunteer and staff Ombudsmen who have been trained to provide the support residents need.

"We know that elder abuse, and in particular financial exploitation, is underreported. Even when it is reported the person living in a care facility is often not offered any type of support to help them get through the trauma and find restitution. Our goal is to fill the information gap by providing residents and their families with hope and access to professionals right there in their own communities"
